

It's Beginning to Look A Lot Like Advent

Towards the end of the Gospel of Mark, in chapter 13, Jesus talks to his disciples about what the end times will be like. You will hear of wars, he says, and rumors of war. Nation will rise against nation. False messiahs will appear. Brother will rise against brother. Children will rise up against their parents. There will be earthquakes and famine and suffering like the world has never seen. The heavens themselves will be shaken, the sun and moon will turn dark, and the very stars will begin to fall.

Surely, this must be it, then. The signs are unmistakable. There is war and political unrest like never before. Sectarian violence and terrorism is committed in the name of religion. Global climate change and the depletion of the ozone layer make the earth an even more fragile place. Natural disasters abound. Families are falling apart. Wall Street and the global economy are collapsing. The unemployment rate is rising. The Democrats are taking over the U.S. government. And, on top of all that, the holiday shopping season is upon us. What more proof do we need that the end is near?

But rather than say that these are the sure and certain signs of the end, Jesus says, "This is but the beginning of the birth pangs!" (13:8). It's beginning to look a lot like Advent!

Advent, from the Latin word *adventus*, which was used in Roman days to signify the ceremonial arrival of the emperor, meaning quite literally "the coming of the deified one." The early Christians were quick to adopt this word and give it new meaning, that the only true Emperor of the world is Jesus Christ, our real Lord and Savior. That is why, rather than submit to the rising powers of the world which seek to convince us there is no hope for the future, the people of God's church rise up in anticipation of the coming of God's good and gracious king. Rather than subscribe to the signs of the times as a forecast of impending darkness and death, the baptized children of God instead light candles on an advent wreath, to serve as a sign of our faith in the God who will save and protect us from a dangerous and uncertain world. That is why we turn in our worship to the deep azure blue of the eastern sky, to remind us of the coming dawn and the Christ who comes to bring hope and light to the world.

Advent is the season God gives us so that we can get past our frantic and desperate ways of thinking and instead see ourselves beyond that which looks like the end of the world. Advent is the time God gives us to slow down, to rest and breathe in deep the gracious words and hope-full promises God has for us, that we might get our priorities straight and not lose sight of what's really important. As witnessed in this wreath of candles that we keep at the center of our worship, Advent helps to keep our hearts centered as well, so that our minds can be focused on the ways God truly comes into the world and into our lives.

Here is where we find God's king, the Christ child, in the palace of a ramshackle stable, enthroned in the dungy straw of a feeding trough for cattle. Born here, into the very midst of the low down and dirty life, we find God's Son, so that we might know for certain God is here, sharing this life with us. God with us, in our daily struggles and concerns. God with us, in our fear and uncertainty over what the future may hold in store. As witnessed in plain water, as experienced in a bit of bread and a little sip of wine. It is in such common and simple things as these that the light of Christ begins to shine upon us, bringing with it the amazing dawn of God's abiding love and grace. These are the true signs of the times, for any who would find true hope and peace in the midst of uncertain and troubling days such as these.

As God's people like to say, it's beginning to look a lot like Advent!

Our Pastor Tim Leaf walked the parade route with a chair strapped to his back bearing a sign proclaiming, 'We have a chair 4 U'. All those who took part in the parade had great fun celebrating and announcing our 50th anniversary and proclaiming our Lutheran Christian faith in the South West Wichita area. The parade trophy that Resurrection received is currently displayed in our Narthex.

Our 50th Anniversary: Remembering Our Past, Rejoicing In Our Future

Last Spring, Evelyn Clark consented to head an important planning team for our church's 50th anniversary celebration. During the first meeting it was agreed this would be a fun celebration and there would be several anniversary events throughout the whole year. After initial planning, a contest to write the anniversary theme was held. The congregation responded with many good suggestions and the theme, *Remembering Our Past, Rejoicing In Our Future* was chosen.

During the summer a logo design was sought and three very gifted members submitted designs. All three designs have been approved and will soon be available to be seen on souvenir items celebrating our anniversary and reaching out as God's Lutheran Church in southwest Sedgwick County. This fall the first public announcement to proclaim our 50th anniversary appeared on the two banners that grace our church sign on 71st Street.

On October 17th, those banners were part of our church float in the Haysville Fall Festival Parade. Both young folks 'rejoicing in our future' and not-so-young folks 'remembering our past' had great fun tossing candy while leading, riding on, walking beside our parade entry. Our pastor walked the parade route and offered an invitation to our church by wearing a chair on his back with a sign reading: "We have a chair 4 U."

On November 9th and 16th we held our first official 50th anniversary event by celebrating our Lutheran heritage with two baptisms on the occasion of the 525th anniversary of Martin Luther's baptism. (You can read more details about this event in another article in this newsletter.) Our 50th anniversary cookbook, "50 Years of Cooking with the Saints", has arrived and is available for your pleasure and perhaps to give as a Christmas gift! It is a collection of tried and true recipes from present members as well as former members and friends.

May 3, 2009 is the actual date of the 50th anniversary of the organization of Resurrection Lutheran Church but plans are to make it a full weekend of events. On Friday evening, May 1st, festivities will begin with an authentic Lutheran 'Happy Hour' followed by a dinner featuring recipes from the new 50th Anniversary cookbook, and fun for the entire family. On Saturday afternoon, we will host an Open House with recognition of former pastors, council persons, and members. A Heritage Room is planned for the west wing with memorabilia and power point presentations of pictures from the past and present. This will also be a time for visiting with returning former members. The afternoon will include the dedication of the Steeple Monument. Sunday morning worship will be followed with a catered dinner and a Service of Rededication for the Future at 1:30.

Obviously much planning is involved and beginning in December, the congregation will be given opportunities to indicate areas in which they would like to assist. Other events are being planned for January, February, and March. A special mailing will go out in March with information regarding housing and reservations for our anniversary weekend. As you set up your 2009 calendar with must do/not to forget dates, circle the weekend of May 1-3. Come and join our celebration!

Soon after they arrive in mid December, and Mary has baked some of her delicious cookies, Pastor Joan will be conducting two Christmas Eve services as well as one service on Christmas Day. We are blessed by their friendship and living the faith with us. We wish them God Speed as they will now Lift High the Cross at St Paul.

Celebrating 50 Years and 525 Years

To celebrate our Lutheran heritage and as part of our church's 50th Anniversary Celebration as God's Lutheran Church in southeast Sedgwick County, we recognized Martin Luther's 525th baptismal anniversary. 11 November 1483 Hans and Margarethe Luther brought their infant son, Martin, to St. Peter Church in Eisleben, Germany to be baptized. 525 years later, the people of that same Lutheran parish, now renamed St. Peter and Paul Church, invited all Lutherans to celebrate the anniversary of Martin Luther's baptism. On that day and the Sundays surrounding it congregations from around the world took part in this special "baptismal festival" as a reminder of God's baptismal grace active in the world today. Resurrection is proud to have been accepted as one of the participating congregations. Baptized in the celebration were Abigail DeWitt on 6 November 2008 and Emery Evans on 16 November 2008.

Martin Luther understood baptism as the beginning and the center of Christian life. That is why, when Luther felt misunderstood and put upon, he would say, "But, I am baptized," which gave him strength in the knowledge that God had not abandoned him.



According to tradition, Martin Luther was baptized in the font pictured above. The rim was added with the inscription: "Remains of the font in which the late Martin Luther was baptized in 1483." The Triumphal cross seen in the reflection in the water is from the middle of the 15th century and is hanging in the choir of St Peter and Paul Church. A photo of the font and Luther's baptismal story was given to Resurrection's newest members of Christ's family, Abigail DeWitt and Emery Evans, both baptized in November.

Sunday School News

Resurrection's Sunday School ministry is weekly growing young people of faith. "Living the Good News" lectionary curriculum guides leaders to shape and transform lives and communities through shared experiences of the Sunday readings. Students ages 3 through 12 participate in stories, projects, singing, acting, and playing that brings the Sunday readings from worship to life. Christmas Craft Day was held on Saturday morning, Dec. 6. Students gathered for a special telling of the Christmas story, unique ornament craft projects, singing, and lunch. Memorable experiences and crafts to treasure made this a memory-making day!!

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Mead's Corner: A Fair Trade Coffeehouse

Mead's Corner is operated by First United Methodist Church of Wichita. Creative and unique for a church, all revenue above expenses are dedicated to direct need services in the community and world. Mead's Corner's vision is to be a place where church and community cross paths. In the first year, proceeds will assist impoverished children at Park Elementary School here at home, as well as assisting hungry children in flood ravaged Myanmar (Burma).

The new business opened November 21st in downtown Wichita at 430 E. Douglas. The menu of course includes espresso, hot or iced latte and coffee, other beverages, panini sandwiches, hand crafted gelato, and other dessert items. The intention is to operate a first-class coffeehouse with art and entertainment that provides a safe and alcohol and tobacco free environment. In the evenings there will be live music, improvisational comedy, poetry reading, and an occasional open mic night. The church is committed to doing what Jesus did, simply spending time with people in an atmosphere of acceptance. The church will host a worship service entitled NEXT, after Sunday closing and offer a once a month open conversation called "Questions About God?" led by one of the members of the church staff.

As you know, Camp Tomah Shinga has a long history of providing youth life-changing experiences through the summer camp program. Thank you for taking up this challenge, encouraging giving and supporting your church camp. We are earnest in our attempts to resource this ministry and we are convinced that Tomah Shinga will continue to be a special place for people of all ages. Your congregation's partnership is a sincerely appreciated gift in our efforts. Thank you so much for empowering us to continue the summer camping program and build Tomah Shinga's year round ministry. We are so pleased to have your partnership.

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COFFEE BAR

A "second altar" has been set up in Fellowship Hall! It may look like a coffee bar, but don't let that fool you! We also gather there for strength and sustenance!

The project began with memorial gifts from the families of Emma Paulson, Lydia Evans and Alice Yoachum's sister, and of Lois Schmidt. These funds were used to purchase a large coffee server. WELCA then purchased the cabinets and counter top. Ray York generously took care of the installation work and expenses.

As the plumbing runs from the sacristry, for a brief time it appeared that coffee might appear in the baptismal font and font water in the coffee, but that was quickly remedied! The whole operation of making coffee is now so simple and so much fun that Stan Jordan may be fighting for his position as official coffee maker.

WELCA (Women of the ELCA) is more than a small group of women gathering to figure out ways to involve people and to make money-- although those rank high on the list! The ladies meet the second Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. for Bible study, fellowship, and service. Recent activities have included a very successful Fall Bazaar that will clear over \$2500 to be used in support of youth activities and for special congregational needs. \$275 in available Thrivent funds will be matched by WELCA to go toward the expansion of the church's sound system.

Each month the ladies host the Haysville Chamber of Commerce noon luncheon for 50 to 60 guests. Our home-cooked meals have proven to be very popular with the Chamber. WELCA has recently received shipment of the new 50th anniversary cookbook, "Fifty Years of Cooking with the Saints." A special feature of the cookbook is the inclusion of recipes of members over the 50-year period.

The Fellowship Hall now includes a coffee bar. The coffee maker was purchased with memorial funds and WELCA carried the cabinetry and electrical installation expenses. This summer, 8 youth attended Camp Tomah Shinga assisted by scholarships from WELCA.

Our current Bible study is a 9-part study of the books of Ruth, Daniel, and Esther. All ladies of the congregation are invited to join us at any meeting!

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Church the Place to be

CTPTB (Church The Place To Be) is a group for youth fourth through seventh grade.

They have been very busy studying the "Fruits of the spirit", cosmic bowling, and even having an overnighter in the sanctuary. The sleepover was a prelude to the early morning the youth spent serving the homeless in the community. They went to St Paul Lutheran Church to cook and serve breakfast for the homeless living in the Wichita area. This group of young people spent time having conversations, playing chess, and even playing the piano for the group that showed up at St Paul's.

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Thrivant and Habitat for Humanity

Thrivent Financial has approved support for building two Thrivent Builds/Wichita Habitat homes in Wichita in 2009. The three Wichita area Thrivent Chapters, through local Lutheran congregations, will again partner with Wichita Habitat for Humanity to help two families become homeowners.

Habitat for Humanity homes are a "hand up" instead of a hand out. Habitat homeowners must work 250-400 hours of sweat equity hours, helping with construction or other Habitat related activities, and complete mandatory homebuyer education classes. They sign a 20-year, zero percent interest, no-profit mortgage to cover the actual cost of building their house. A typical monthly mortgage payment including homeowner's insurance and taxes is \$350 and an average utility bill is \$100 for these Energy Star-certified homes.

More Saturdays and more end of the week days will be available for building than for past Thrivent Builds. In addition to builders, lunch providers, greeters and financial supporters will be needed.

A memorable interview with charter member Lila Stout in honor of Resurrection's 50th anniversary

Interviewed by Maggie and Paxton Leaf

Q: What favorite memories of the old church do you have?

The first service was in the basement of the parsonage. The pastor pulled a curtain across the laundry room and his wife played the piano. There was a Sunday School class for kids, mostly teenagers at that time, not any tiny ones like now. Mrs. Nielsen would take kids up the living room for Sunday School. I had just moved to Haysville two weeks before when I found a notice on my door about a Lutheran church just getting started in Haysville.

Q: How many people were there at first?

In 1957 there were about 8-10 people. Then two years later we built Freeberg and there were about 25-35 people.

Q: How old is Freeberg?

It was built in 1959

Q: Who was the pastor?

Leo Nielsen

Q: How many pastors since then?

Oh, let's see. Pastor Swenson, Pastor Freeberg, Pastor Rowalt, Pastor Lindberg, Pastor Fitz, Pastor Jensen, and Pastor Leaf

Q: Did any pastors have kids?

Yes the Niensens has a son and Pastor Leaf had two children

Q: Did it have coffee fellowship?

Yes. definitely

Q: Was there a nursery?

Yes but it was very small.

Q: Did your children go to the nursery?

Yes when we moved here, Patti was 4 years old and she went to the nursery.

Q: What were your kids' favorite memories?

You'd have to ask them. I'm sure Patti would say that hers was meeting and marrying Pastor Jensen.

Q: Where was the first church located?

On 71st Street

Q: Wow, all our churches have been on 71st Street. How long did services last?

About an hour

Q: Was church better then than now?

About the same. Some preachers preach longer than others.

Q: Our dad ranks I bet in the top 3 of longest sermons. What was the first church made of?

Bricks and wood, inside and cement floors.

If you happened to be a patient on 7 west at St. Joe Hospital on Thanksgiving Day, you would have noticed some extra excitement on the floor. Channel 12 news and the Wichita Eagle were at the hospital to interview Kris Zoch, a member of our Resurrection family about a new program she brought to the hospital.

Kris has been working very hard for the past six months to introduce Pet Therapy to the patients on her floor. She felt that having dogs visit the patients on the floor would not only cure some of the loneliness of being in the hospital, but would have a positive effect on the health of post-surgery patients. She did months of research to prove to the hospital that it could be done, and that it would lower patients' blood pressure, their heart-rate, and shorten their hospital stays. She also hoped it would bring happiness to the patients and make them a little less lonely...especially during the holiday season.



Where's Barry?

An opportunity at work has found me living in Germany for three and a half months. In our offices' first opportunity to work with Airbus Germany, we are learning the tools and methods they use for fuselage design. The idea was to learn as we did preliminary work on the aircraft that would eventually become the USAF KC-45, but the delay of the tanker decision has necessitated shifts to other programs. Most of that work is on the A350, the composite airplane that will compete with Boeing's 787. We have been well received by our German counterparts, fortunately for us Airbus has selected English as its official language.

There are five primary Lutheran churches here in Hamburg and at this point I have attended three of them. With their tall spires they all stand out as landmarks on the Hamburg skyline. St. Michaelis was the first church I attended in Germany, its 132 meter tower houses the largest clock of its kind in Germany. The next one was St. Jacobi which has a famous Arp-Schnitger organ, the largest Baroque organ in North Europe. The service opened and closed with pieces by Bach, if I deciphered the bulletin correctly. I have also attended the new St. Nikolai. The original St. Nikolai was heavily damaged by bombing in World War II, the 147 meter spire remains as a memorial against the war. While I know almost no German, the liturgy of the services seems pretty similar to that used back home so I can kind of follow along. Haven't gotten much out of the sermons but the music has been really nice.



I also attended church service at All Saints' Church, commonly referred to as Schlosskirche (Castle Church), in Lutherstadt Wittenberg. This is the church where Martin Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses. The Wittenberg English Ministry has English services on Saturday evenings so I was able to understand one church service while in Germany. As luck would have it, I ended up being there while they were celebrating the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's arrival in Wittenberg. They reenacted Luther crossing the Elbe River and entering the town with a speech at the Lutherhaus, but it was hard to get too much out of it not knowing German.

I've had the opportunity for some other weekend travels while here, including several places in Germany as well as trips to Austria, Denmark, Sweden and Greece. It's been a good experience.
