

Stumbling Stones of Grace



"Stumbling Stones of Grace" is our theme for Lent 2009 and is being lifted up each Wednesday evening during the Lenten season as a part of our midweek worship series. The Lenten series began with imposition of ashes and the invitation to select a 'stumbling stone' from a large bowl of stones near the altar. Worshipers were further encouraged to continue collecting a stone every time they pass by the bowl all during Lent. With stones serving as a reminder of our sins and all that works to separate us from God, we are focusing on two things: 1) God's will for our lives in the Ten Commandments, and 2) God's gift of repentance that helps us to see and believe in the cross of Christ. On Good Friday, all the stones that have been collected by midweek worshippers will then be brought back to the church and used as a special part of the Good Friday service.

Church the Place To Be, made up of fourth-seventh grade youth and their parents, served as worship assistants for the Ash Wednesday service. At 6:00 pm each Lenten Wednesday, there will be a potluck meal featuring soups and stews, followed by worship with collection of another 'Stumbling Stone of Grace'.

Holy Week

HOLY WEEK SERVICES Christians the world over are called to remember Jesus' final days and the events leading up to his death on a cross. As we follow in the footsteps of our Lord's passion, we meditate on how Holy Week mirrors the baptized life where, in baptism, we die with Christ that we may be raised up with Him to new life.

5 April Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We will share in the procession of palms and the reading together of the Passion According to St. Matthew.

9 April Maundy Thursday worship begins at 7:00 PM. On this "the night in which our Lord was betrayed" we begin the celebration of "Triduum" (the Three Days) with the Rite of Foot Washing and the Last Supper. Such holy acts as these serve to bring us more deeply into the mystery of our faith. The service will conclude with the stripping of the altar.

10 April Good Friday worship begins at 7:00 PM. In this time of remembering the death of our Lord, we celebrate God's victory in the cross, especially as revealed through the reading of the Passion According to St. John.

12 April Easter Sunday will begin with our Easter Vigil Sunrise Service starting at 6:00 AM. We will light our Christ candle from the fire outside, and then process into the sanctuary by candle light. Our worship will include the celebration of our Lord's resurrection with a recounting of God's saving acts throughout all history and sharing in Holy Communion. Regular Sunday morning Easter services with Holy Communion will be held at 8:30 and 11:00 AM.

12 April Sunday School Easter Celebration for all youth will start at 10:00 AM in the Green Room (the west wing). Students will join their classes for learning time then at 10:00. An Easter Egg Hunt will follow the class time and will take place outside, weather permitting!! Kids of all ages are invited. Bring a basket!!

CAMPBELL SOUP LABELS PROGRAM

In the past members of Resurrection have collected Campbell labels to help buy vans needed to bring children in to the Lutheran Navajo Mission school in Rock Point AZ. These vans have a limited life span as roads on the reservation are so rough. Now, however, instead of saving labels, Campbell's just requires the UPC (bar code) insignia be sent. Any bar code whose number begins with 51 or 14 will qualify. If the bar code has dotted lines around or near it, cut on the lines. A container for these bar codes has been placed in the narthex. A sheet showing these products is also available.

The General Mills Box Tops for Education proofs of purchase are also very valuable, as they convert into cash for the Mission school these proofs may also be placed in the Campbell's container.

Lenten offerings to go to Navajo Lutheran Mission

Your Lenten offerings this year will go to the ELCA's Navajo Lutheran Mission in Rock Point AZ, in the Four Corners area where Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Utah meet. 50 years ago Lutheran missionaries arrived at remote Rock Point village. Today House of Prayer Lutheran Church has Navajo services for all ages. The Mission also provides a Kindergarten through 6th grade school for over 60 children which offers an alternative to Bureau of Indian Affairs and community schools, and provides an education that reflects Christian values while respecting Navajo culture and tradition. It is also a place for periodic eye and health exams, and a thrift shop that provides a major service to the 3000 residents of Rock Point and surrounding areas. Food and medical services are more than 50 miles away, and general shopping is 115 miles away in Farmington NM. A clinic staffed by a registered nurse and visiting doctors is scheduled to open soon.

More than programs and services, however, the Mission is all about people; the Navajo live with social problems, abuse, housing needs, debilitating diseases like diabetes and alcoholism, unemployment, poverty, and limited access to health care, and in many cases do not have electricity or water. The Navajo Lutheran Mission is committed to improving the lives of the many people in the area.

“What do you do for fun?” asked a curious member.





Tim Meyer began his study at Luther Seminary this past fall without leaving Wichita Kansas through the Distributed Learning Master of Divinity degree program at Luther Seminary. Meyer is able to stay in his community, work at Resurrection Lutheran church in Haysville Kansas, and complete a degree because of the program, which allows him to take most of his courses on line with periodic intensive courses on campus.

“I don’t fit the standard profile of a seminarian,” Meyer said, “but when exploring and discerning the call to parish ministry, this program showed promise that God could still use me. This unique community of cohort members, home congregation, and teaching parish is amazing. The DL program will let me learn to serve from where I am, and within a diverse community that is a real treasure.”

The program at Luther Seminary provides a hands-on, practical approach to theological education, allowing students to incorporate their work experiences into the classroom potentially without having to relocate to St Paul Minnesota. Most distributed learning classes are conducted online with just two annual two-week sessions on campus.




