Resurrection Rovers

This is an informal group of whoever may have time and inclination to explore Kansas points of interest.

On September 26, a beautiful day, 7 Resurrection Rovers met for a day trip to Abilene, KS. We had a delightful tour of the Seelye mansion in the morning, followed by a great lunch, then two more informative tours of President Eisenhower's boyhood home as well as the Eisenhower Presidential Museum.

In 1890, 20 year old Alfred Seeyle got off the train in Abilene and stayed. Having medical

schooling, he began making patent medicines which he sold door-to-door. His best seller was Wasa-Tusa, which could be taken internally or used as a lotion and given to your horses, cattle, wife or children. The product cost 2 cents a bottle with 3 cents going to the salesman and 95 cents to Dr Seeyle.

In 1893, he married Jennie Curts of Abilene. In 1904, the Seeyles traveled to the St Louis World's Fair to select new inventions for the new home they were



having built--a 25 room Georgian-style mansion. They met Thomas Edison and purchased his electric lights, telephones, and phonograph, all of which are still in use in the mansion. Mr Steinway of New York personally selected a grand piano and had it shipped to Abilene.

Tiffany lamps, autographed Mark Twain books, and a bowling alley in the basement were only a few of the wonders we enjoyed on our tour of the Seeyle Mansion. When he found that the Battens were from Clearwater, the present owner of the mansion, Terry Tietjens, told us that he was a cousin of the Bohnings.

After lunch we toured the Eisenhower Center family home and museum with information not only about Dwight Eisenhower but also about WWII, the participants and events, and documents, films, and memorabilia of the times.

I find great joy in the ministry that I see happening in our church. On a personal note I want to share with you who may not know that due to unfortunate circumstances my great granddaughter Adelise (Adi) Rose Falconburg has ended up in state custody. Since no one else in the family was prepared to take her, I was blessed enough to get kinship placement. So, here I am at age seventy-seven with my precious charge who just started kindergarten this fall. I wouldn't have it any other way. It would have broken my heart to see her handed to strangers as foster parents.

Let me share with you what has happened in my church family. On two separate occasions weeks apart different men walked up to shake hands with me with bills in their hand. One was for anything Adi needed, the other for anything she wanted for Christmas. Believe me, they were very generous gifts.

And there were additional blessings for me and Adi. The Care Team voted some money without my knowledge at the time and one of the women in the congregation took Adi shopping for clothes. I sure was grateful for that. Many of the women in the church have offered their services in case I get stuck and need someone to babysit. Clothing is being offered to the degree that I have to say no because I simply am out of room. We have retired nurses who give me good advice. I panic when she isn't feeling well and it sure is a comfort that I have my own medical staff available.

I am not the only one. I get bits and pieces of what is going on, sometimes by just overhearing a conversation. One family does respite care weekly. One woman recently took a member to an outpatient operation which lasted a whole day. She stayed with her the whole day. Rides are offered. Meals taken in. Follow-up phone calls are made. Hospital visitations are made. Private prayers are offered. People willingly volunteer to substitute worship duties when another can't make it. This is all done without fanfare.

In short, I see Christ in you in all you say and do.

In September, Resurrection women travelled to Lake of the Ozark, MO for their Central States Synod Women of the ELCA annual convention. Bishop Roger Gustavson spoke and, BIG NEWS, a Scholarship Fund was created. Basic scholarship criteria call for a post high school woman who is a member of an ELCA congregation in the Central States Synod. Each scholarship will not exceed \$1000 and is a one-time, nonrenewable scholarship. The scholarship(s) will be funded by donations. The goal is to give out the first scholarship(s) in the fall of 2016. As a beginning \$450 was received into this fund at the 2014 convention.

God's Work, Our Hands

Sept. 7th, 2014, the Evangelical Lutheran Church America – 4 million members in nearly 10,000 congregations –once again took part in a church wide service initiative: "God's Work, Our Hands". This



day was dedicated to serving the communities in which we live. This Sunday was also our Rally Day and rally we did! Resurrection joined the God's Work, Our Hands project by working together locally to pull weeds and generally clean flower beds at the Haysville Old Town Historical Center. A multigenerational crew assembled following worship to enjoy a sandwich lunch which was an example of the lunches supplied to homeless folks on Sandwich Saturdays, and then to work and sweat together. Nancy Harris, who works at the Haysville Historical Center to maintain the grounds expressed her appreciation and surprise at the number of volunteers and the amount of work accomplished. God's Work! Our Hands! Good Work, Resurrection!











This time of year we typically have our ELCA World Hunger Appeal. There is another group that receives support from WHA and the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod World Relief and that is Lutheran World Relief.

Lutheran World Relief and ELCA World Hunger Appeal are known for having the lowest administrative costs among charitable organizations. During the year as you make your charitable contributions, consider these two groups along with two other ELCA projects: the Malaria Campaign and ELCA Disaster Response. Envelopes have been placed in sanctuary chair pockets and you can use these to indicate your gifts. You may also indicate your choice on the memo line of your check. Checks may be made out to RLC and we will forward all gifts to the organizations indicated.

World War II left one-fifth of the world's Lutherans homeless. Here in the US, Lutheran formed a new agency Lutheran World Relief to help in Europe. Today LWR partners with local groups around the world to provide immediate and long-term assistance and to provide lasting solutions to poverty.

Over 50,000 children have crossed our borders from Central America. As these children are deported, they will be returning to the poverty that caused the situation. LWR is working with national governments, organizations and church bodies in El Salvador and Honduras to provide shelter, material needs, and protection for these children and their families being returned from the US and Mexico.

As the Palestinian-Israeli conflict continues, LWR is partnering with the Department of Service to the Palestine Refugees which runs clinics in the Gaza area. Another partner International Orthodox Christian Charities has been distributing food and providing shelter to displaced persons.

Two Lutheran hospitals in Liberia –Curran and Phebe- are treating patients who have contracted Ebola. Health care workers are at great risk of contracting Ebola from the patients who come into their care. To help ensure their safety protection equipment is essential The ELCA is partnering with the Lutheran Church in Liberia and Global Health Ministries to send five pallets of Personal Protection Equipment to the two hospitals. LWR is also partnering to conduct training on the prevention of Ebola for health care workers in Liberia. Those receiving the training will, in turn, go on to train other staff in their respective health centers

Tim & Donelle Frawley

On the Occasion of Tim's Retirement from the Air National Guard



Tim was born in Mankato, Minnesota the fifth child and first boy in a family of 7 children, all born one year apart. Was there a 'first boy' celebration? "It was the only birth when my mom received flowers." Tim's father was a police officer, his mother worked as an administration specialist for a construction company. The family moved to Richfield, MN briefly and then Bloomington, a suburb of Minneapolis. Tim was baptized and confirmed in the Catholic faith, the family worshipping at St. Edward's Parish. Growing up, Tim was busy with sports playing hockey through Jr. High in a city league and in lots of pick-up matches with friends. In Minnesota hockey was played on an outdoor, shovel off the snow first, hockey rink. BRRR! In Jr.

High Tim also played football and wrestled. Even his work revolved around sports as he worked as a vendor for the Vikings, Twins and Minnesota Kicks and also as a busboy in a private restaurant for the North Stars. During the summers he worked midnight to mid-day as a golf course groundskeeper. If you have visited the Mall of America, Tim says that huge project was built on the site of the former Vikings and Twins stadium where he worked. As a senior in high school, on January 27, 1981, Tim signed up with the US Air Force. In June he graduated from Jefferson High School and 3 weeks later, on June 23, 1981, he began basic training. In 1982, Tim met his air force buddy's girlfriend, Donelle. Somehow a turnaround occurred and Tim and Donelle were married in 1984. He says, "I picked that date because it is an important day in America's history. The attack on Pearl Harbor is what got the USA involved in WWII. President Roosevelt called December 7th 1941 a date that will live in infamy. My paternal grandfather was killed in action on Utah Beach, D-Day, 6 June 1944."



Donelle was born in Russell, KS 1965. In 1969 shortly after the death of her brother, the family moved to Haysville where she grew up with her sister, Sue. Donelle is a lifelong Lutheran. She was baptized at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Russell, KS on October 10th, 1965 and confirmed at Good Shepherd Lutheran in Wichita. Her father was a foreman in electrical construction; her mother, Beryl Beeson, worked as does now as a bookkeeper. Donelle recalls playing Barbie dolls with her playmate, Diana Evans, and in school enjoyed participating in all around sports. Her first job was working at 'Lil Duffer', a Haysville hamburger place. When she & Tim dated they were quite young and mainly went to movies, to 81

Speedway races or just got together with friends. In May 1984 Donelle graduated from Campus High and that Fall on September 22nd she and

Tim were married by Pastor Swenson at Resurrection. Yes, if you do the math, that's 30 years, and Donelle said they went out to dinner to celebrate their anniversary. They love to travel, but just now are waiting to see how the changes in retirement settle out. She and Tim have 2 daughters and one son-in-law: Sara and David Setzer and Sasha, plus two grand dogs. Donelle has worked for the Clearwater School District for 20 years. She coached cheerleading for 6 years and presently is a teacher's aide with Kindergarten—third graders.
