Tornado in Eureka

Eureka sustained the 2nd major tornado in 2 years on July 26th. 8 people were injured, at this point all have been treated and released. 167 homes were affected with 19 of these a total loss. 20 commercial buildings were affected with 8 of these destroyed. The Community Activity Center and the Eureka Junior-Senior High buildings were impacted. Pastor Tim Meyer of Christ Lutheran Church in Eureka posted this on Facebook on June 29th: *“In the middle of suffering and tragedy God visits with grace and mercy. The outpouring of help from the community and the volunteers who keep coming from all over the state give hope to our town.”*

The cleanup will go on for a while yet, then there will be long-term recovery that the Greenwood County Emergency Management folks will be organizing. The Eureka Area Ministerial Alliance will again be in the middle of short- and long-term recovery work.

One of the ways we can support Mosaic is providing prizes for bingo games which are often part of special events for people attending their programs. Cross of Glory is one of the churches which does this. Also Mosaic sells "Jumpy Monkey" coffee which provides employment for some of their clients. Their funding is largely from Medicaid and expanding Medicaid in Kansas would let them serve more people.

Reflections from Bishop Roger

“This Changes Everything.” That was the banner that more than 31,000 of us assembled under at the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston. So what’s the “This?” God’s call, God’s grace, God’s love, and God’s hope. And they do indeed change everything, as we heard from speaker after speaker who invited our youth to embrace God’s unconditional love in Jesus Christ.

Four days of worship, interactive learning, faith formation, connecting with other youth in our synod and the wider church, and service work in Houston produced some pretty exhausted young people and their adult leaders, but you’d be hard-pressed to find anybody who didn’t have a great time. One personal note: On Synod Day, when the Central States youth gathered for worship, each of us was given a blue stone with the name Jesus written on one side. We were to write our own first name and last initial on the other side. We pooled all of those stones when we came forward in a thanksgiving for baptism, then picked one up randomly when we came forward for communion.

The idea was to commit to praying daily for the person who we knew only by first name. Nobody mentioned an expiration date, so Garrett, you’ll be in my prayers from now on; prayers of thanksgiving for your life, for God’s guidance as you make decisions, for hope as you create your future, for joy in your living, for a growing faith as you follow where Christ leads. They got the theme right: *This does change everything.*

We will have another church clean-up day this fall and we look forward to seeing you there. –



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Karen Avritt

I was born in Concordia, KS, 3 months early. I was a twin, but due to our early birth, my twin sister, Sharron Ann died at 4 days old. My mother, Ona Mae Springsted, was a telephone operator and my father, Gerald Edward Springsted, was an accountant for Western Power. My younger sister, Cheryl, was born 9 years later. When I was young our family moved to Dodge City, KS. I attended Dodge City High School, ironically at the same time as my future husband, although we didn't meet until several years after graduation.



I was baptized and married at the United Presbyterian Church in Dodge City, KS. I attended the Sublette Christian Church for most of my adult life, until I moved to Haysville to help take care of my granddaughter. My son and daughter-in-law are Lutheran and invited me to attend Resurrection with them this past spring. I liked it because it was a small church and everyone was very friendly, and so I decided to become a member when they did.

I attended Fort Hays State University and graduated with a degree in Elementary Education in 1968. I student taught in Dodge City and took my first teaching job in Sublette, KS in January of 1969. I taught there for 40 years, until my retirement in 2009. Even after retiring, I couldn't part from the school and spent several years going in 4 days a week for a few hours to tutor and read with 2nd graders.

When I started teaching, I taught 1st grade for about 20 years. Then I taught writing and reading skills for K-2, although one year I taught middle school as well. I love teaching and had worked with younger students for so long that middle school students were quite an adjustment. After that, I became the school reading specialist and Title 1 reading for the elementary school.

Before I had my own children, I also taught migrant school every summer. This was a program for the children of the migrant workers who would come in to work the sugar beets. Their children had a mixed academic experience. Some had never attended school before, and most spoke no English. I found this to be extremely fulfilling. While I worked on teaching English and reading, a lot of this job focused on exposing these children to new experiences. We would take them on field trips, out to eat, and once we even took them to ride in a plane. We would also take them to the dentist. I loved teaching migrant school, but the summer I adopted my oldest, Michelle, was my last year to teach migrant school. After that, I spent my summers with her, initially chasing after a toddler and it didn't take long to progress to swim meets and t-ball games.

My husband, Allen "Mickey" Avritt grew up in Dodge City. After he graduated high school, he started college. However, a professor made a negative remark about him attending school to avoid Vietnam, and he promptly left school and enlisted in the army. He was a military intelligence specialist during the Vietnam War, and served 3 tours there. We met during his leave on the final tour. When we met, I had just finished student teaching. My mentor teacher, Penny Avritt, thought that she should set me up with her brother. I was not a fan of blind dates, and I remember that she told me to 'suck it up, because it wasn't like I was going to marry the guy or anything'. Our first date, which included his sister and her husband, was attending Christmas Eve Services together at Dodge City Presbyterian Church. Our second date was a bit more conventional and we went to the movies. This sounds really cliché, but when he dropped me off that night and kissed me goodbye, I knew I would marry him one day! Shortly after that, he had to return to Vietnam, and we continued dating and writing to one another. We were married on April 1, 1972, over Easter weekend. We were married for 42

years. Mickey passed away on June 11, 2014 after a long illness. I miss him every day, but I have our memories and our beautiful children to remember him.

I have 4 beautiful children. I always wanted to be a mother. However, after many years and several unsuccessful fertility treatments, I was not able to get pregnant. Adoption is an emotional roller coaster and it took several years, and to be honest, multiple heartbreaks, before I was blessed with my daughter, Michelle Lynne. She was born on February 22, 1976 and we took her home on the 25th. She is a 3rd grade teacher in Sublette, KS now, with my grandson, Jeremiah Zane.

About 2 years after my daughter was born, Mickey and I felt like our family had room to grow and we began the adoption process again. My son, Michael Allen, was born September 30, 1981. Due to some complicated custody/parental rights issues between his biological parents, he stayed with 'cradle parents' for 4 weeks. Cradle parents are short-term foster parents who take care of infants between the time of birth and the time when they can be placed in their adoptive home. We finally were able to take him home at a month old. He was born with a cleft lip and had to have surgery at 3 months old. He had a challenging childhood with several medical issues, but I am proud of the man he is today. Michael now lives in Garden City, KS with his wife Tiffany.

When I was in my early 40s, I went to my doctor for a check-up, and left rather upset because my blood sugar was high and my blood pressure was slightly elevated, with no known cause. He made me come back a month later, after I returned from vacation (where I rode all the roller coasters at Silver Dollar City). My doctor was trying to determine what was going on health wise, and decided to check me with a fetal heart monitor. Imagine my shock when it picked up a heartbeat! I had spent nearly 20 years believing that I was unable to have children biologically, and then found out that I was nearly 5 months pregnant! Matthew Jon was born on November 26, 1988. I named him Matthew because it means Gift from God, and he was my miracle baby! However, God wasn't finished with my family just yet. About a year after Matt, I found out I was pregnant again! Amanda Dawn was born October 7, 1990. After her birth, our family was finally complete. Amanda Miranda lives in Abilene, KS, with her husband Jorge Miranda.

My ultimate goal is to see all of our children settled and happy. They are all grown up now, and working on their own careers and families. I also enjoy spoiling my grandchildren. My grandson, Jeremiah, is 13. He is growing into a mature young man. He loves sports and takes wonderful care of his new cousin, Evelyn, when they get to visit. I moved to Haysville last year upon the birth of my granddaughter, Evelyn, to care for her while her parents are at work. Taking care of her keeps me busy and very happy. She is a crazy girl and one of the loudest babies I've ever met! I am hopeful for more grandkids to spoil in the future!

Matt and Lyn Avritt

Lyn was born on January 2, 1989 in West Chester, Pennsylvania, on the evening of a Philadelphia Eagles game. My mother always says that she had to keep reminding my father and the doctor that she was in labor to tear them away from the game. My mother, Deb Buckley, was a social worker when I was first born but has been a middle school science teacher for the last 10 years. My father works for a doctor and medical network doing claims. They live in Tennessee now, having moved there 3 years ago. I was the oldest child; my younger brother Shawn was born in 1991 and Greg in 1994.

When I was in first grade, my family moved to Glendale, Arizona, where I did most of my 'growing up.' Last time I went back to visit, the area had been very developed, but when I was a child, I remember it being on the outskirts of the desert. We used to ride our bikes to the lemon orchards and mountain bike through the desert.


Chris & Jen Knaak
